

#### SEAMER PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The *September* meeting of the Parish Council was held at Seamer Memorial Hall. Fifteen members of the public were in attendance.

The planning application for change of use to church in Seamer Road was discussed with many objections and expressions of concern as well as some supporters. On Councils website, noted 38 objections to date, so a high level of interest.

**Bus Shelter update** - This issue has taken a year and a half to date and is a continued source of frustration due to Council highway procedures and tender requirements. Its position is proposed to be amended following contact with a prospective qualified contractor after two mini tenders with no expressions of interest. This will require a crown lift of the horse chestnut tree adjacent to it, which is in hand as part of the authorized arboriculture works on Parish Council land (see below). The unit is in store with the supplier at present, to be installed after the facilitation works have been completed.

**Village Gardener** – The Village Gardener, who had done a sterling job, is retiring so we are looking for a new gardener to work approx. 2 hours per week, although the work was recognised as taking longer in the summer and at planting time. 2 or 3 of the tubs were rotten and needed to be removed. We have purchased 4 new half barrels to replace them, and others were to be scrapped as there are too many planters presently.

**Village Pond** – Labman have kindly offered to help with designing an aerator and are conducting a depth survey of the pond prior to installation. It was agreed that initially work would need to be done to clear the pond of debris and overgrown water lilies and straw bale before the new device could be installed. We will be looking for volunteers to help with this.

**Tree Safety Audit** The audit had been completed earlier this year by an Arborist and the work needed had been the subject of an agreed quotation. A qualified contractor had been appointed and the work was due to start imminently

**Police** – 2 incidents were reported in the period.

The police also came to the Village Hall Pop-In on September 18<sup>th</sup>. This was well attended by residents who all had the opportunity to speak to the officers and raise any concerns. Police Community Officers numbers are being reduced from c5 officers to c2. This may mean the number of visits by these officers to the Pop in per year will be reduced. Obviously, reduction in Police numbers may also have an effect on rural crime responses.

Community Fund – A request was submitted for £300 to support the weekly "Play and Stay" group held in the Village Hall and is to be used for purchasing extra resources. This group is a valuable asset to the village and PC resolved to support this application.

**Village Hall Committee** reported that the last meeting of the Village Hall Committee had been productive, with the following issues discussed: · More work to be done on the roof. Proposed works on lean to at rear had also been discussed.

Planned events included a jazz night on 7<sup>th</sup> October; Halloween 28<sup>th</sup> October; Quiz 7<sup>th</sup> November; Singing by candlelight 9<sup>th</sup> December.

Electricity contract discussed and need for solar panels which might feasibly also charge electric car parking. Noted that the Community Fund might also assist with the proposed installation cost.

Sound system is being assessed with a view to a potential upgrade.

Minutes of this meeting (and agendas prior to meetings) are displayed on the noticeboards and on the website.

The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled to take place on 16<sup>th</sup> January at the Village Hall, commencing at 7pm.

Residents can access information about Parish Council and Community Fund matters in the following ways:

- a) Attendance at the bimonthly Parish Council meetings, details of which are publicised in various locations: e.g., Parish Council noticeboards, website.
- b) The Grapevine, where articles are regularly published.
- c) Parish Council minutes; these are displayed on noticeboards and on the website.
- d) Residents can contact the Parish Council via email or telephone to discuss any matters that are of concern to them.

All matters concerned with the Community Fund are discussed as an agenda item at Parish Council meetings. Any residents who attend form part of the discussion and all viewpoints are taken into consideration when making a final decision.

There are 11 farthings in the shape of a horseshoe pinned onto the board and one possible missing one at the top.

Dave Thompson took the plaque, removed many layers of paint and presented it back to the Memorial Hall beautifully boxed and varnished.

So then the mystery of who was represented began.

Four names are on the Memorial Plaque in the hall shown earlier.

Driver Sidney Appleton of the Royal Fleet Auxiliary
Private John Paylor of the Royal Fleet Auxiliary
Coms T A Barr of the 4th Yorkshire Regiment
Private Charles Southern of the Durham Light Infantry

We know that Jack Ward returned safely but injured and our sixth farthing could represent Percy Hutchinson

That still leaves the mystery of the remaining five or six. Other names being followed up are

Fred Entwhistle William Bayles George Britten Robert Alfred Smith Jack Petlar

#### SPEEDWATCH NEWS

The Speedwatch team would like to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Stay safe driving!!

As the weather has got colder and wetter, we have decided that for road safety (and our comfort!) we will be suspending watches until the weather improves (probably February at the earliest).

The VAS has now left us and is not due to return to us until towards the end of January. We have had problems with the software after a new update to it and are still trying to find our way around it to get more information from the data.

However, we have found that in 21 days over 300 cars (15 a day) going through Tame Bridge towards Stokesley, out a total of nearly 20,000, exceeded 60 mph with a maximum speed of 85 mph and 3 over 80mph.

Also through Seamer towards Stokesley on Saturday, Sundays and Mondays, 40% of drivers exceed the speed limit dropping to nearer 30% on other week days. The maximum speed was 65mph.

### INFORMATION FROM NORTH YORKSHIRECOMMUNITY POLICE

#### PROTECT YOUR HOME - LEAVE A LIGHT ON!

Is your house a target for a burglar?

Burglars are often opportunistic thieves who prey on houses and flats. They seek out any opening that they can take advantage of. A darkened or empty house is a target for a burglar.

Close and lock all doors and windows, even only going out for a minute Make sure valuables are out of sight

Keep handbags and keys away from the letterbox or cat flap, and hide all keys to cars and property

Set you burglar alarm

If out all day, then it is advisable to use a timer device to automatically turn lights and a radio or TV on at night

If required, call your local police on 101, In an emergency, call 999

#### BE AWARE OF COLD CALLERS.

We have had reports in North Yorkshire about cold callers knocking on doors and/or leaflets for traders being put through the door.

Scammers are most likely to target elderly and vulnerable people and our advice is to always say **NO** to cold callers. Seamer is in NO COLD CALLERS Zone (signs around the village on lamp posts) and therefore it is an offence to cold call here, **even if they say they have permission.** (*Editor:* I know of at least one elderly person in Seamer who recently was pressurised to buy goods at an inflated price).

Bogus traders will often point out a minor repair which, after they are let into the property, escalates into a list of jobs that may be overpriced, unnecessary and unsafe. They also try to sell goods at inflated prices on the basis of that they are helping the seller out.

'Take Five' – stop and take a moment and think, do I really need this work done or goods offered? Obtain other known traders quotes and seek advice, and recommendations from friends and relatives.

#### Top Tips

If it is out of the blue, it's not for you! Don't agree to work from an unsolicited, cold call.

Be aware of 'alarm bell' tactics, claims such as –

'I was working in the area and saw that your garden/roof needed urgent attention'; 'we are working at one of your neighbours' and we have some

material left over'; 'I can take you to the bank/cashpoint to get the money'.

If you want some work undertaken, get a number of detailed quotes in writing, including full contact details and a detailed breakdown of exactly what work will be done.

Be cautious about any requests for large deposits. For larger work, agree when staged payments will be paid and what work should be completed before any money is handed over. Stick to what is agreed.

Ensure the trader has sent over contract of the total price before any work starts and information regarding statutory 14 days cancellation rights. The trader should never ask someone to sign these away.

Check with friends and family for trusted recommendations and consider a trading standards' approved trader, from the Buy with Confidence scheme.

For more advice on consumer rights, or to report a rogue trader to trading standards, contact the Citizens Advice national consumer helpline on 0808 223 1133 or by visiting its website citizensadvice.org.uk.

If residents feel threatened or intimated by a cold caller, they should report it immediately to the police by calling 999. Non-urgent issues can be reported to the police via 101.

#### THINK LIKE A THIEF

Before heading to bed tonight, doing these simple checks can mean our homes stay safe and secure

We advise on locking your doors behind you whenever you return home, but always best to double check front and rear doors are shut and locked before heading to sleep

We've found most burglaries happen via unlocked doors as opportunistic thieves seek out any opening that they can take advantage of.

Are all your keys and valuables out of sight, and not within reach of windows or letterboxes?

The most common items taken in a burglary are car keys, cash and bank cards so especially keep these items out of sight

Double check your vehicles are locked, don't give them the opportunity.

#### **GARAGE THEFTS**

Over the last few weeks we've noticed an increase in attempts to break in to garages, sheds and outbuildings. Some of these attempts have been unsophisticated, such as trying to pull back wood panels, or cut through locks, and it seems the thieves have been deterred by strong padlocks and other security measures.

These burglary attempts are a timely reminder to be vigilant, and improve your property's security. Here are some tips to help you do just that:-

It's worth having a good padlock on the door with no exposed screws.

Pay attention to hinges, as these are sometimes easily removable. If you have windows, these could be vulnerable unless they're secured with wire mesh or grills.

Alarm it - if not wired to the house security system, consider a battery operated garage or shed alarm.

Lock it, hide it or mark it - don't give them the opportunity for tools to commit a crime. Lock everything away securely. Tools can be locked inside a locker or box or secured with a chain. Secure your motorcycle or bicycle to the ground or to a lockable stand within a locked garage or shed It's always worth draping an old sheet or blanket over the top of mowers or bikes to keep them covered from view.

Property marking your items is advisable and some tools can be painted with your name or postcode. Forensic marking is also an option.

If you do fall victim to burglary, check that your home insurance covers the contents of your shed or outbuildings from theft.

Lastly, but most importantly, never leave your garage or shed door unlocked if you're not around.

We urge residents and businesses to report suspicious activity or burglary incidents via the North Yorkshire Police website or by calling us on 101. If a burglary is in progress, always dial 999 for an emergency response.
