Farewell Kay

Sadly, on February 6th the village lost a much loved resident and friend - Kay Rees. Her funeral took place on February 28th at St Joseph's Church, Stokesley before being laid to rest in St. Martin's churchyard, Seamer. The sun shone and her favorite flowers, daffodils, decorated the church and were handed out to everyone who attended. Afterwards Kay's family and friends gathered in Seamer Village Hall to celebrate her life in the place which she held a lot of affection for.

Kay came to live in Leconfield, Seamer in 1995 with her husband Brian. She continued her career as a primary school teacher for several more years before finally retiring.

Over the next twenty five years Kay became involved with the running of the village hall and groups. Kay was a dedicated committee member and served as Chair to keep the hall open before it was initially refurbished in 2005. She retired in 2022.

In 1996 Kay started a table tennis club with the purchase of a table tennis table and bats. From small beginnings the club flourished and in 2013 another table was purchased. Kay loved playing and even at 90 years old she could beat most members many years younger than herself. The club is still popular and meets weekly.

In 2004 Kay started a carpet bowls club with the purchase of a second hand mat and several sets of bowls. This was never a game to be played seriously - more for fun with the company of fellow members and the same applies today.

In 2006 together with her friends Joan Barnes and Sue and Jim Scheilling, Kay started the popular Quiz Nights which have taken place most years since and have raised much needed funds for the hall.

Over the years Kay also organised table top sales, card making days, ran the tombola with Joan at Seamer Show until the last show in 2007, helped at jumble sales, Royal celebrations – the last being the Platinum Jubilee – plus many other events.



She really embraced village life.

On a personal note, Kay and I enjoyed many holidays together. This was when I found out she was a shopaholic. Kay loved looking around shops no matter where we were. We joined Stokesley U3a gardening and natural history groups and enjoyed the trips out to many local locations. Eating out was another of Kay's passions and we often went out for lunch or afternoon tea with other friends from the village. Walking was another pastime she loved and during the last two years Kay enjoyed walking

down to the duckpond and along Holme Lane – just to get some fresh air and see what was going on.

Kay, you were a very special friend of mine and of many other residents in the village and you are certainly missed.

In November the 100+ Club was 10 years old. Over the last year it has raised £1,480 of which £740 was given out as prizes and the other £740 donated to the village hall funds. Although the number of members has decreased to 122, it is still successful and much appreciated by the village hall committee members and we hope you will continue to support it.

For those members who joined in February to April last year, this means that you are due to join again. I will contact you be email, phone or call and see you. If you are not at home, I will leave a letter with details of how to contact me.

To help me to remind you when your renewal fees are due, could you please let me have your e-mail address or telephone number. This is easier than me coming to see you.

If you have recently moved here and would like to become a member or to rejoin, it costs £12 a year per number and each month half the monthly money is given out as prize money and the other half goes to the village hall funds.

How it works

You pay £1 per month / £12 per year and receive one number which is entered into each monthly prize draw. Half of the money raised goes to the village hall funds the other half is divided into 5 prizes i.e. £150 raised = £75 for the village hall and 5 prizes of £25, £20, £15, £10 and £5.

To be able to run this Club we have a Gaming Licence from North Yorkshire Council which costs £20 per year.

Seamer Community Speed Watch (CSW)

At the end of 2024 the village members of Seamer CSW received the following message from Chief Constable Jo Shiner (Sussex Police) who is the Roads Policing Lead for the National Police Chiefs' Council.

"My thanks extend to all involved in the CSW scheme from yourselves as the public volunteers monitoring the roads, capturing the offences and sending them in, to our Police Volunteers who provide a lot of assistance to me in setting up and running the scheme day-to-day and to our Police Officers, PCSOs and Specials who



provide support to their local communities. We are currently running between 85-90 groups that have registered with the scheme and around a third to a half of them are active at any one time.

For those who would like to know, the overall contribution from Community Speed Watch groups across North Yorkshire in 2024 is as follows:

Number of vehicles monitored – 100,988

Number of Deployments completed - 722

Number of Offences Processed - 3728

Letter 1 - 3473

Letter 2 – 229

3rd Offences - 26

The purpose of CSW is to remind drivers of the consequences of excess speed on local communities by police sending speed education letters to offenders rather than penalising them with courses, fines or points.

3rd time offenders can expect a visit from the police to provide a firmer education. As can be seen from the figures less than 1% of first time offenders reach this threshold.

Minutes Seamer Parish Council Meeting Jan 2025

District Councillor Hugill was not able to make the meeting but sent a written report.

Councils have now received from Government their final settlement figure ahead of the budget and Council Tax setting which does not make good reading for North Yorkshire Council.

Despite welcome increases in grants for adult social care, children services and homelessness, the combination of employers National Insurance costs and the cessation of Rural Services Grant sees the council's bottom line worse off by £6.7m.

The council has received no Recovery Grant at all as the government has used a formula to target those areas with the highest levels of deprivation. Areas of higher deprivation in the county have therefore been "averaged out".

Allocations for children services have also been allocated on a new formula which places greater emphasis on deprivation and is again at the expense of more rural county areas.

Additional funding for those more urban deprived areas has been introduced in advance of the longer-term funding reform for local government yet the cessation of Rural Services Grant has been implemented immediately with no transitioning relief. It has been indicated that government will review rural pressures as part of the longer-term funding reform 2025/26 figures show that urban authorities receive 41% more in government funded spending power per capita compared to rural areas. This disparity has widened from last year, highlighting the growing inequities in the distribution of government support. Furthermore, despite receiving significantly less government funded spending power, rural residents continue to pay 20% more in Council Tax per head than their urban counterparts. One positive to appear from this gloomy scenario is that we are starting to deliver savings of up to £ 60m as result of the move to one Council from the former two tier set up of the Districts and County.

The bus shelter is now complete with a total cost of £14,587.91 funded from district council £2k, Community Infrastructure Levy £3,762, Community Fund £6,394.69 and VAT reclaimed £2,431.22.

We discussed the village pond and agreed to consider instructing a report from a pond specialist remaintenance and health of village pond. PC will undertake some research and obtain quotes to present to meeting.

We discussed tree overhanging churchyard at after consultation with tree surgeon it has been agreed to leave for further review if required.

Police reports said there were no incidents in November and two in December (theft and violence against the person).

Received the bank account balances up to 31st December 2024 and bank reconciliation.
