All we are planning to do is lift the willows a couple of metres and tidy back some of the scrub land that is underneath them and overgrown with ivy and nettles. Hopefully if this work is carried out this will open up the area under the trees and this can be kept back with regular cutting.

Speed Safety Van Deployment in Tame Bridge



Figures up until the end of May 2025

It has been queried why the Speed Watch Motorcycle no longer does any visits to Seamer. Apparently, he has now retired and the site he used is no longer suitable, so no replacement has been put in place. The police do say if anyone has a suitable drive/entrance that could be used they would look at it.

The Speed Watch team continue to monitor traffic in the village. Below are figures from last year and up until the end of May for this year. The team urgently need more volunteers so if anyone is willing to help please contact the Parish Clerk who will pass your details on.

2024

5231 vehicles monitored 399 offences registered 307 offences processed (276 sent letter 1, 23 sent letter 2, 8 committed 3rd offence and were contacted by Police)

Up until end May 2025

2582 vehicles monitored 238 offences registered 209 offences processed (200 sent letter 1, 9 sent letter 2)

Speeding in Seamer and Tame Bridge is a hot topic for residents and following recent discussions with the new Police Sergeant at Stokesley we can hopefully get more action to help manage the issue.



A Centenary Celebration to Remember

After months of planning and preparation, the Seamer Memorial Hall Committee proudly hosted a spectacular 100th Birthday celebration - an event that brought joy, sunshine, and community spirit in equal measure.

Held on the green opposite the Hall, the centenary party welcomed around 200 residents from across the parish. With entertainment, food, activities and even sunshine laid on, it was a fitting tribute to a much-loved village institution.

The day's festivities began with music from the Tees Components Brass Band, followed by a delightful performance from the Stokesley Primary Academy choir. Eric the Magician wowed children and adults alike, and local duo Paul & Kelly rounded off the entertainment with a crowdpleasing set.

There was plenty for all ages to enjoy: a face painter who brought colour to cheeks both young and old, a busy art table, hook-a-duck, quiz sheets, a special 100 Board Game, under-5s play corner, and a lively round of family sports to end the day.

A highlight for many was the "Draw Your Hall" competition, with



entries from both children and adults. The winners were:

At the heart of the celebration was a beautiful birthday cake, lovingly made by committee member Victoria Bagnall. It was ceremonially cut by Ron Kirk (who gave a short history of the Hall), Christine Cooper, and David Ward - the village's oldest lifelong resident. Fittingly, David's father and Christine's grandfather were both among the local young men honoured when the Memorial Hall was first built in 1925, following the First World War.


All children who took part in the sports received sweet cones as a treat.

Rights of Way

You asked about footpaths in Seamer Parish and I thought I would write to you about those over Oneholmes Farm.

We moved here nearly sixty years ago now and, one wet day some years later I decided to review our footpaths which originally were mostly Church or postmans tracks. One for example ran straight from our farmhouse to Seamer Hill Farm, the route to Seamer churches used by my predecessors many years ago. Another ran along the front of our kitchen window and on to Seamer Moor farm, okay I suppose for the cook to pass treats to path users or have a natter!

I had a think and decided to reroute them to the present configuration, one on the top of the hill joining the roads at each end mainly because of the views it opened up and the other a bit further away from the house, avoiding the dangers of the farmyard and on to Seamer Moor farm. In accordance with the rules we submitted this suggestion along with the deletion of the existing paths to the Council and the Ramblers Association who approved it, in the latter's case after an inspection. Signs were erected: stiles were built over the fences where needed and have since been mended from time to time as necessary. There is one small section of the original path left which joins the new lower path to Moor farm.

I have since made two successful applications for gates on the path nearer to Seamer which were approved on the condition that the gates were removed when there are no stock in the fields. Since the planting of the new hedge two more gates have been permitted but we have yet to build them.

We try to mow the top footpath from time to time to ensure easy passage but users seem to keep it down and to keep the stiles in good repair.

I hope those who use them enjoy the views and am grateful that most keep to the paths.

V E Day Celebrations

Our VE Day celebrations took place on Sunday 4th July in the village hall. To mark the 80th Anniversary a banner was displayed in the village on the railings by the road.

Although only a small number of residents came to celebrate, we enjoyed a lovely afternoon with music, quizzes and food brought to share. Several ladies entered the spirit of the day by dressing up in 1940's outfits.





Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) Sign Results

The speed sign was deployed In Seamer from the 9th June to the 30th June and at Tame Bridge from the 1st July to 21st July.

Seamer Village

The results show that during this period of 21 days 61,080 vehicles travelled through Seamer from the pond to Tanton Road Junction. It is a big increase in the number of vehicles (nearly twice that of 2023 figures) but there is a slight drop in their overall average speed (from 28.3 to 28.1mph). The highest recorded speeds were 50/55 mph a drop from previous values of 60/65mph. Drivers seem to be lowering their speeds in general, but still too many (20,819) are still exceeding the limit 0f 30 mph (33%), that is almost 1000 per day! Saturday and Sundays were less busy but had higher average speeds and higher percentage of speeders.

Tame Bridge

The results for Tame Bridge are only for 18 days due to road works being carried out near the VAS site and an early final reading due to requiring the results for Grapevine. The VAS was operating to detect vehicles travelling on the straight main road from Hutton Rudby to Stokesley before the turnings to Croft Hills and Seamer where the speed limit is 40 mph. The number of vehicles (21611) show a daily increase of 15% since last comparable results from October 2024. The overall percentage of speeders has increased from approximately 20% to nearly 25%. There was 1 vehicle recorded at 85mph, 2 at 80, 3 at 75, 9 at 70 and 34 at 65mph (the device reports results in 5 mph intervals). Whilst taking the results (about 2 minutes), with my car hazard lights flashing and me wearing a high vis jacket, two cars changed lanes at high speed to "avoid" me, with traffic coming the other way!

The Police get a copy of Grapevine and discussions with the Parish Council have taken place regarding the results and these, along with speedwatch results, are beginning to promote greater cooperation and more positive action.
